We currently have eighteen members.

ANNUAL HIGHLIGHTS

In May 2022, members gathered to develop the Koop's strategic plan at a session hosted in Ainsworth, funded by the Columbia Basin Trust. It was a critical step in determining the Co-operative's next steps as we navigate the loss of ongoing operational funding and recommit to member priorities. In the Fall, the plan was finalized for 2022-2024.

The new executive director prioritized meeting in person and online with members throughout the year to understand their priorities and finalize the strategic plan. Additionally, the SKY team expanded, increasing the number of children served across the region, and the Nobody's Perfect Parenting series rebounded from low delivery during the pandemic to offering 10 series throughout the year.

PROJECT HIGHLIGHTS

STRENGTHENING THE SOCIAL SECTOR'S CAPACITY



The capacity building grant, funded by the Columbia Basin Trust, makes trainings, workshops, and networking events that build member and sector capacity possible. Other member benefits come through the information sharing and sector news the Koop provides and a venue to discuss important issues.

The Koop supports member organizations' executive directors, board, and staff members.

Sector trends that have been identified this year, include challenges with recruitment and retention, isolation in leadership and burnout, an everchanging contracts landscape, a desire to decolonize policy, and, for many, a growing demand for services since the pandemic hit. These topics are reflected in the capacity building priorities that will guide this project moving forward.

FINANCE NETWORK

The Finance Network meetings were held twice throughout the year, one to address questions with a payroll software that a number of members use, and another for member finance staff to connect and troubleshoot several topics.

EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR & LEADERSHIP SUPPORT

Executive Director Network Meetings were held bi-monthly. These serve as an opportunity for leaders to connect, engage in peer mentorship, and remain informed on sector issues, and collaborate on service.

The HR Network hosted a "Rumbling with Vulnerability" workshop, facilitated by Warren Helfrich, providing valuable learnings on courageous leadership.

TRUTH & RECONCILIATION

In partnership with Koop member, Circle of Indigenous Nations Society (COINS), the Koop hosted training and discussions to deepen member knowledge of Indigenous ceremony, traditions and engaged in dialogue surrounding cultural safety in social services.

STRATEGIC PLANNING

In May 2022, a Koop strategic planning session was held. Funded by the Trust, members set a clear path for the Co-operative to focus on financial sustainability, and continued member growth and connection.

Nobody's Perfect

Across the Kootenay-Boundary region, 10 Nobody's Perfect Parenting series were held, rebounding from the COVID-19 pandemic that saw fewer programs run.

Nobody's Perfect is a facilitated parenting program for parents of children from birth to age five. The program is designed to meet the needs of parents who are young, single, socially or geographically isolated, or have low income or limited formal education, offered in communities by facilitators to help support parents and young children. Parents expressed that the series made them feel "connected and understood" and provided valuable tools for navigating parenting at different ages and stages.

Our managing partners for delivering the NP series are ASLCS, BFS, KFP, KCS, KKS, SCRS, TFS, and WEG. (See back page for definitions of acronyms).

Highlights

30 children were served by SKY from April 2022 to March 2023.

13 interviews were conducted. Of those, 12 interviews were conducted in SKY interview rooms.

SKY Coordinators held 17 MDT meetings in our 6 communities.

69 multidisciplinary team members participate on SKY teams.


Successes

SKY referrals increased from zero during the first six months of 2022 (due to staff vacancies), to 8 referrals in the first two months of on-boarding regional SKY Coordinators

In October 2022, 18 multidisciplinary (MDT) members from 5 different communities attended Stepwise Interview Training organized by SKY. Funding was obtained from the British Columbia Ministry of Public Safety and Solicitor General.

SKY received an Accredited Facility Dog through the Lions Foundation of Canada. Trusty joined the SKY team in April 2023 and has already begun supporting children and youth in our region.

In February 2023, SKY hosted a Regional Gathering focusing on education about online child sexual exploitation. 33 MDT members attended with each of our 6 SKY communities represented.



2022-2023 Finances

2022-2023 Revenue



- Columbia Basin Trust Capacity Building Grants, 42%
- Department of Justice SKY, 21%
- Ministry Public Safety & Solicitor General SKY, 13%
- Interior Health Nobody's Perfect, 12%

The most significant expense in 2022-2023 was wages and benefits. This area grew with the implementation of the new staff model for SKY, which included bringing on two part-time coordinators. Nobody's Perfect Parenting program rebounded with strong activity following a COVID-19 dip over the last few years.

Overall revenue (\$417,663) was up compared to 2021-2022 (\$378,523), and overall expenses were also slightly up (\$388,840 versus \$374,893); a result of increased program expenses, and a growing team, though there were fewer consulting services under total expenses. We ended the year with an excess of \$28,823 in revenue over expenditures. These funds are being allocated to achieving a balanced 2023-2024 budget and planning for a future without currently secured future ongoing operational funds.
