A heartfelt thank-you to Myriam Zbinden, our Executive Assistant, who truly keeps us all supported and on track. Her behind-the-scenes work is deeply valued and absolutely essential to the functioning of both the board and the organization.

Although technically outside of this reporting year, I also want to note two important staffing transitions: Hannah's departure for maternity leave, and the welcome of Heather into her role. Finally, thank you to our dedicated staff and board members. Your commitment, care, and hard work continue to move this organization forward. It's been a year of momentum, learning, and alignment—and I look forward to what comes next.

This year included several exciting developments including:


- The Koop MOVED to a new office location on Baker Street in Nelson to accommodate its growing team

FINANCIAL REPORT

Overall revenue (\$715,000) was up considerably compared to 2023-2024 (\$528,132), and overall expenses increased correspondingly (\$676,472 versus \$481,566), despite the end to the Columbia Basin Trust's longtime core funding.


This growth arose from increased program expenses, including the Koop's first year as Foundry Kootenay Boundary's lead agency, and additional SKY funding via Ministry of Public Safety & Solicitor General.

We ended the year with an excess of \$38,528 in revenue over expenditures. These funds are being allocated to their respective programs and increased administrative hours to enable our strategic priorities ahead.



PROJECTS

Child, Youth & Family Gathering

- On June 26th in Castlegar, over 75 service providers came together for a meaningful day of connection and learning.
- The event opened with a warm welcome from the Circle of Indigenous Nations Society, followed by an engaging networking activity that encouraged participants to reflect on both their personal and organizational approaches to trauma-informed practice.
- Dr. Sean Larsen, Director of Operations for Child and Youth Mental Health, delivered a compelling presentation on trauma-informed practice, setting the tone for the day's learning.
- In the afternoon, attendees received a brief update from MCFD EDS before joining three of five available World Café-style discussion sessions, promoting rich dialogue and shared insights across diverse service areas.
- Special thanks to The Federation of Community Social Services of BC for generously funding this valuable opportunity.

Cooperative Development Fund

- The Co-operators Foundation's Cooperative Development Fund has successfully wrapped up its activities.
- As part of the initiative, Koop Board videos were showcased at the Civic Theatre over a six-week period, helping to raise awareness and engagement.
- Additionally, in partnership with Pathwise Solutions, the Executive Director and Executive Assistant collaborated to refresh and update the Koop website, enhancing its functionality and user experience.

Community Services Grant

- The Community Services Grant—funded through the Red Cross as part of the Mental Health Evaluation and Pilot Project Grant—supported important work focused on staff wellness.
- A Project Coordinator led the development and implementation of an employee wellness survey across community services. The findings were compiled into a comprehensive report, complete with recommendations to strengthen workplace culture and support staff mental health.
- Based on these insights, a series of educational sessions were delivered to both staff and leadership, aimed at fostering a healthier, more supportive work environment.

Towards Truth & Reconciliation

• In September, 2024 the Koop collaborated with COINS and offered the opportunity to member organizations to join an engaging Truth and Reconciliation Learning Circle hosted by COINS.

PROGRAMS

The Safe Kids and Youth program was created through collaboration between police, child protection, crown counsel, victim services, schools, healthcare, and community services to provide a more seamless response to child and youth abuse, helping reduce system-induced trauma.

Files

Over the past fiscal year, the SKY program coordinated 26 cases involving child and youth victims and three cases involving witnesses of abuse. There was an increase in the number of referrals made by SKY to community service agencies, reflecting strengthened collaboration and a more proactive approach in establishing long-term, comprehensive support networks for victims and their families.

Trusty

Trusty continues to be an asset to the success of the SKY Program. This year, Trusty's role in supporting the emotional well-being of children and youth remained essential. With a calm and compassionate presence, he has helped reduce anxiety, build trust, and create a safe and supportive environment.





Interview Rooms

Remote Testimony equipment was installed in Castlegar and Nakusp, allowing victims to testify remotely, rather than in a courtroom. This ensured children and youth could testify in a safe and comfortable environment, while securing the necessary testimony for Crown and Counsel.

Projects

SKY facilitated a comprehensive Child Forensic Interview Training in response to a shortage of trained officers in the West Kootenays. This equipped RCMP officers with the knowledge and techniques necessary for conducting trauma-informed interviews with child victims.

Interior Health and Shared Care collaborated with SKY to work on the development of medical support for children and youth who have disclosed abuse: The SKY team collaborated with several local and regional health providers to find ways to provide long-term care to victims with no family doctor and is approved to prioritize unconnected child and youth patients who have been abused to receive a family doctor from IH. This has resulted in tangible benefits for SKY program users who received health care upon our referral.

In response to interest in developing a rural service model CYAC in the East Kootenay like the SKY program in the West Kootenay, the Department of Justice (DOJ) awarded funding to conduct a feasibility study. This was conducted through December 2024 to April of 2025, with 6 communities and five First Nations, these included: Columbia Lake First Nation, Cranbrook, Creston, Fernie, Invermere, Kimberley, Radium Hot Springs, St. Mary's First Nation, Shuswap Indian Band, Sparwood, Tobacco Plains First Nation and Windermere. · FOUNDRY

Foundry offers free and confidential supports for young people ages 12 to 24, and their caregivers including mental health care, substance use services, physical & sexual healthcare, youth and family peer supports, and social services. The services can be accessed both online and in-person in communities across BC. Foundry service centres aim to provide safe, welcoming, and judgment-free spaces where youth can access the supports they need to navigate various challenges.

In June 2024, the Koop was awarded a contract to be part of the Foundry's Phase 5 Expansion Project to bring Integrated Youth Services (IYS) to the West Kootenay and Boundary regions. In a first for Foundry's service history, Foundry Central Office (FCO) agreed to establish and support the implementation of a "hub and spoke" service model to meet needs of rural and remote communities. Meaning that instead of one Foundry location to service our region, there will be multiple smaller locations dispersed throughout multiple communities.

The official name of our project is Foundry Kootenay Boundary, which was co-created with FCO, and covers the West Kootenay and Boundary regions and stretches north-south from Nakusp to Trail, and east-west from Rock Creek to Kaslo.





The project lead, Michelle Oakley, was hired in the second half of Fiscal Year (FY) 2024-2025 and has since built and strengthened relationships with service providers and potential Foundry partners throughout the Kootenay Boundary region. Working closely with the Koop's Executive Director and the Koop's Foundry co-applicants (Freedom Quest, Boundary Family Services, Kootenay Boundary Division of Family Practice, and Castlegar Community Services), the first year has consisted of onboarding into the provincial Foundry community network and proactively engaging with community service providers throughout Kootenay Boundary.

In addition to this foundational engagement work, the Koop's Foundry staff has focused on Foundry's required deliverables (as per our FCO funding agreement) which includes, but is not limited to: project charter, project workplan and timeline, project budgets, website landing page, asset mapping, and community communications.

The Koop works closely with FCO and collaborates during our monthly calls and on an as-needed basis. In addition, the Koop participates in a monthly cohort meeting for all the Phase 5 Foundry communities in development. The Koop's Foundry team members also visited multiple Foundry centres in BC and collaborates with operating Foundry centres for information sharing and collective enrichment.

During the last few months of FY 2024-2025, the Koop team prepared to hire a Youth and Family Engagement Coordinator and purchased promotional supplies and equipment for large-scale engagement activities.





Nobody's Perfect is a facilitated parenting program for parents of children from birth to age five and is designed to meet the needs of parents who are young, single, socially or geographically isolated, or have low income or limited formal education. The program teaches positive parenting techniques and provides community connection.

Across the Kootenay-Boundary region, 6 Nobody's Perfect Parenting series were held, despite experiencing challenges with limited facilitators.
